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Course Description

Libraries are transforming into collaborative spaces that enhance student engagement and learning outcomes. Although stacks of books may not be the focal point of many libraries, they must have accessible collections for students and educators while also offering space for tutoring and learning centers, makerspaces, collaboration areas, and technology – all to help support various learning styles. This session will explore effective strategies to utilize furniture, fixtures, and equipment to reduce the amount of space being used for book storage, contribute to LEED and LEVEL by BIFMA certifications, and fundamentally reshape spaces to enhance the student experience in primary, secondary, and higher education.
